**RAMBLINGS FROM THE CHAIR**

Often when I sit down to pen this column I have a collection of thoughts, in no particular order, that I wish to get across. On this occasion there is a little more structure as the result of the meeting of Trustees on October 20th. The meeting was convened to discuss the key messages for the forthcoming Half-Yearly Meeting (HYM), details of which can be found on the outside back cover.

The agenda for the meeting had 3 items:

1. The need for volunteers, including a replacement for the chairman.
2. The Society's finances, including an update on direct debit.
3. The Society's response to government cuts in expenditure in as far as they affect rights of way work.

Perhaps I should point out that formal meetings of the trustees are few and far between; rather there is an ongoing dialogue between myself and the other trustees. A formal meeting is held shortly before the AGM and, as yesterday, before the HYM. Other meetings are on an *ad hoc* basis as circumstances dictate.

What follows are not the notes of the trustee meeting; rather it is my thoughts on how I will deliver the key messages at the half year meeting.

### **Peak and Northern Footpaths Society**

I want to spend a few minutes reflecting on our name. It is a much shortened version of the name our founding fathers came up with back in 1894. In fact it is worth noting that the name was developed and refined over several meetings. The first part, "Peak and Northern", is

shortened from "Peak District and Northern Counties" and describes very accurately where we exert our influence.

"Footpaths" was originally "Footpaths Preservation", succinctly describing what we are still about. The last word, "Society", is the reason for my digression.

We are indeed a Society; that is, we are: "an association of persons united by a common aim or interest".

The point I am trying to make is that the Society is not just about what the Chairman, the trustees or the officers think or say. The officers of the Society are members just like you. We give our time to deliver the "common aim". Our Society is a volunteer society which relies on the good will of the members giving their time in support of that "common aim".

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### **I will not be standing for Chairman at the AGM**

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There are always opportunities to get involved as a volunteer and, just as important, to have your say in how the Society is managed. The Half Year Meeting is just such an opportunity to air your views.

### **Volunteers**

As a general rule we get a good response to our "volunteers wanted" adverts. However, one area where we have a desperate need of volunteers is for general administrative tasks at Taylor House. There is no way to make these jobs look exciting, and the fact that they are office based does nothing to add to their appeal. However, they are essential to the

smooth running of the Society, and are also well within the capability of any member. No special skills are required and training will be given. So please give a few hours of your time to help run your society.

I said in the last newsletter that I didn't expect to be inundated with calls from people offering to lead the Society as Chair/man/woman/person. In hindsight I wonder if that piece was seen as just a little tongue in cheek. I must make my position clear to the membership, just as I have to the trustees and the officers. My position is that I will NOT be standing for the position of Chairman at the next AGM. I repeat here the words I used in the last newsletter:

There is a great team at PNFS and you can expect a lot of support. Absolutely no experience is necessary – I had none when I took on the VC's job and went on to become Chairman. Please don't assume one of the existing officers is waiting to step into my shoes; they aren't; they are all happy doing the job they currently do. You can rely on their support and my support during a handover period. At times you will get more advice, from all quarters, than you can handle. It is a great job, one that I will miss. But I am already planning my next steps and like a lot of you I have a family and a desire to travel more. So no excuses: give it some thought and get in touch if you want to head the leading regional Society solely concerned with footpath protection.

The next Chairperson might not yet be a member of the Society. Perhaps you know someone who is looking for interesting voluntary work. If so, bring them along to the open day at Taylor House on December 8th (details on page 9).

Speaking of volunteers, this is a good point to mention that Rhoda Barnett, one of our Courts and Inquiries Officers, has agreed to become a Trustee of the Society. According to the constitution her appointment will, have to be ratified by the AGM, but until then she will be able to carry out all the duties associated with the post.

### **Finance**

Since the last newsletter the Society has received a generous legacy of £15,345 from the estate of Mr Frank Butterworth. We have also received a number of significant one-off donations from individual members who wish to remain anonymous.

Legacies and one-off donations are very welcome and are always put to good use, but they do not represent regular income and we cannot rely on them or plan our expenditure around them.

Our newsletter has carried an appeal for members to consider making regular, monthly donations via standing order. Those members who have responded have been very generous and are to be thanked. Unfortunately the number of members that have responded remains in single figures and we have to consider how we can increase our income.

Back in 2007 the AGM voted to close the gap between income and expenditure. The following year the AGM voted to increase subscriptions. During my time as Chairman we have examined every line of our accounts and made considerable savings.

The fact remains that we still have an underlying gap between income and expenditure of around £8,000 a year

The Half-Yearly Meeting will be a major opportunity for the membership to have a say on how we bridge that gap.

Direct debits are finally coming to PNFS. We will be writing to all members inviting them to sign up to DD for subscription renewals in the very near future.

### **Government cuts**

I am sure we all have concerns about the latest government cuts, and those concerns will not be limited to how they affect rights of way work. However, the Society has but one concern: the protection of rights of way.

Whatever the cuts, the law has not changed: each Highway Authority is bound by law to assert and protect the rights of walkers. The Society has the same legal remedies when a Highway Authority fails to carry out those duties.

The feelings of the trustees are clear: the Society must not get drawn into political debate or discussion on how Highway Authorities manage their budgets. We must remain resolute in our determination to protect the rights of all walkers.

### **Repeal of section 130 of Highways Act**

This law is the bane of all landowners who have public rights of way on their land. It allows an individual who is very likely to be an extremist neighbour with an agenda to take action against a local authority for alleged obstructions to footpaths. It engages the landowner in a lengthy and costly dispute with three parties (the local authority, the neighbour and himself) and ends in some very questionable judgements which are often of no value to anyone and could have been better sorted out if all three parties could have sat around a table to resolve an issue. The local authority ends up paying a fortune for something they have the power to control themselves. This is a law which is a typical labour law which was designed to set people against people and neighbours against neighbours and is of absolutely no benefit to anyone. It is important to remember that this applies to public rights of way over people's private land.

This idea will save local highway authorities hundreds of thousands of pounds a year and will allow them to make their own judgements and allow them to downsize their staff considerably in order that they don't have to deal with these extremists. It will also allow farmers to concentrate their efforts on making their farms viable as opposed to spending thousands of pounds lining the pockets of lawyers in defending their rights and property from extremists who's agenda is very often questionable.



## WALKS FOR ALL – PROJECT UPDATE

## THE REAL WORK OF THE SOCIETY

is, of course, ensuring that the footpath network is kept in good repair and remains unobstructed. That can only be achieved by the vigilant and painstaking work of our many volunteers – Inspectors and Officers. The following extracts from our file illustrate the enthusiasm and energy with which our work is pursued.

**Colne Valley Footpath 136** - The PROW officer has met the new landowner on site and requested removal of the unauthorised barrier. As of yesterday (21/9) there had been no response. This has been reported to the PROW officer who will issue a '14 day notice'. I sense that his new line manager – who has no knowledge of PROW law and practice – will not support further action. If the barrier remains on my return from holiday on October 12th, I will start the process under s.130A. While the worst aspects of the obstruction have been dealt with, i.e. removing misleading notices and barbed wire and making a way through at the side for walkers, there is still a locked barrier across most of the lane, which deters people from using the path.

**Inspector Keith Feltham** received this encouraging reply to his concerns about paths in Sutton cum Duckmanton and Ashover:

"Dear Keith,  
Thank you for your recent Public Rights of Way reports and BVPI Survey Forms for Sutton cum Duckmanton and Ashover Parishes.

I have already served notice on the landowner for the cropping obstruction and stiles in disrepair on Sutton c Duckmanton

Footpath 18. I hope to resolve these issues very soon.

I have agreed with the landowner at Hagg Farm that Footpath 13 should be diverted legally to the alternative route avoiding the property. The landowner is applying for a permanent diversion.

I have also served notice on the landowner regarding the stile in disrepair on Sutton cum Duckmanton Footpath 13.

I inspected Sutton cum Duckmanton Footpath 11 and have spoken to the landowner regarding the line of the footpath. The landowner would like to query the line of the path with our

Mapping Team; this issue will require further investigations.

I inspected Ashover Footpath 104 and I do not consider that any further action is required. It is not clear on the ground if the waymarked route follows the definitive line of the path; however, the route shown on your plan running down the very steep embankment is dangerous for the public to walk.

Thank you for your help. Lynn Taylor (Environmental Services)"

**Rossington Bridleway 14** - I have been approached by an acquaintance in the village of Rossington near Doncaster to say that a bridleway bridge across the River Torne was systematically dismantled over 2 nights by persons unknown and removed for its scrap value. The council have removed what is left on safety grounds and imposed a Traffic Restriction Order. The Senior PROW



is awaiting a design for a new concrete bridge from the Bridges Department, but beyond that any progress is in doubt. The bridleway is the only link between Rossington and a neighbouring village for walkers, horse riders and off-road cyclists. I am not seeking any authorisations yet, but this is one that I feel will require action eventually.

27/08/10: I attended a meeting with the rights of way unit on 30th June, at which the main item discussed was the design of the new bridge. An agreed design means that they can bid for funding from senior managers as their own budget is insufficient to cover the estimated £50,000-£75,000 cost of the replacement bridge.

Latest: The Legal Events Committee has granted me authority to serve s.56 HA80 notice at the optimum moment.

**South Darley Footpath 16 and Bridleway 13** - proposed s257 TCPA 1990 order to divert paths to enable planning permission for the extension of Tearsall Quarry, Bonsall to be implemented. The National Park Authority has been consulted on a proposed diversion order. I have submitted a holding objection as I am not satisfied that walkers' interests will be safeguarded before the restoration of the quarry. I am still in

discussion with the rights of way officer and, through him, the quarry company. I may need to obtain approval for a formal objection if my concerns are not met.

**OPEN DAY AT TAYLOR HOUSE**

There will be an open day at Taylor House on December 8th starting at 1000. This is an opportunity for potential volunteers to see what is involved and to discuss their potential involvement with the Officers.

The address of Taylor House is on the outside back cover. It is a 15 minute walk from Stockport railway station

Members' donations have continued to fund new PNFS signposts, mostly in far-flung locations, bringing welcome publicity. In July **S382** was erected at Dean Farm, east of Sabden, as a memorial to former footpath inspector Harry Sutcliffe, who is also commemorated at S376 on the Tame Valley Way.

**S386** at Wiswell Moor Houses, was placed west of Sabden as a memorial to Ken Cooper, chairman of Trafford Walkers. Both signs lie in the pleasant walking area south of Pendle Hill and Clitheroe and are our first in the area.

September brought no fewer than eight new signs:

**S385** at Tatham Parish Church, near Lowgill north of Bowland, celebrates the 90<sup>th</sup> birthday of Esther Horsfall (nee Halstead), presently of Whaley Bridge, but formerly of High Thrusgill above the Hindburn valley. The happy idea of her daughter Jean, it stands close to the school Esther walked to from 1927 to 1931, a round trip of 4 miles. It is our most northerly sign.

**The total number of signposts in the ground is 319**

**S387** stands a good mile south of it, above Stair End bridge, and is also on Esther's route. It is dedicated to Roy Clough, who now lives in South Devon, but who sent us a more-than-generous donation asking that we should keep an eye on S267 on Turton Moor, north of Bolton, which is in memory of Roy's aunt, Ruth Clough.

**S393** went up a day later at Manor House Farm, Marsden. It is a third memorial to

Frank Griffiths of Alkington. The other two are at Torside Clough, Longdentdale and Dunsop Bridge, Bowland (see below).

John Hodgson and Ted Wolfe had a further busy and wet day erecting three signposts at Brennand Farm, Dunsop Bridge, Bowland.

**S388** has its plate bolted to a stone outbuilding, like S255 (1995). To minimise maintenance for S388 we used stainless steel expanding bolts. An earlier donation from Graham Bullough paid for it. His parents are commemorated on S033, in the area near Hayfield where they walked,

**S389** (see above) stands at a key junction uphill and north of the farm; the gift of Mrs Pat Griffiths.

**S390** stands 200' or so below by the side of the Brennand River, where numerous tracks diverge through a series of five-barred gates. It was funded by Martin Lee and bears his chosen couplet by Walt Whitman : "Afoot and light-hearted, I take to the open road." These three signs are our first in Bowland and stand at its geographical centre, thanks to the consent of Ian Grindy of United Utilities and farmer Geoffrey Walker, their tenant. Thanks are also due to John and Ted, who worked in poor conditions to get the job done.

**S391** stands at Further Harrop Farm, below Charles Head on the old route to Rainow, in traditional PNFS territory. It celebrates the 70<sup>th</sup> birthday of our footpaths inspector John Goodman, who lives locally.

**S392** stands in front of Goldsitch Farm,

Black Brook, Quarnford, about one mile east of Roach End.

If I've got my sums right, it brings our total number of signposts in the ground to 319. Four more signposts are in the pipeline: one at Bonsall near Matlock Bath; one at Taxal Moor above the Goyt Valley; and two at Padfield, Glossop.

So what can you do to help? Planned signposts at Mixon near Onecote and at Vincent House Farm, Hartington are still awaiting donations, but now a modest sum has been made available by the officers, thanks to a recent bequest. More pressing is the need for your help

with maintenance, whether it is unskilled cleaning of algae from "Join Us" and memorial plaques or the semi-skilled task of repainting, which calls for a steady hand. If you feel the urge to help, call me on 0161 283 7824.

Finally I'd like to thank John Harker, who shares my interest in the history of Signpost 112, which was re-erected recently at the Moorland Centre, Edale. Rather than being "lost" between 1965 and 2008, when it resurfaced via PNP Ranger Sheila McHale, John tells me that it spent much of the intervening time in a Sheffield member's garden.

In 1965, when the Society had no use for it, he offered to give it a home in return for a donation. When he had to move to a flat, it found its way back to Edale via another Sheffield member. This probably explains why the plate was in such good condition after 43 years' absence, but it leaves me wondering where its counterpart S113 might be. Is it somewhere out there in need of re-adoption? Watch this space!
